


Catalog of Hand made wooden crafts from a crafty old codger.



Owl Banks

Everything here is handmade by me. My feeble old mind is always thinking of something new to do.

These cute little Owl Banks with clear Plexiglass front allow you to see the money. It takes all coins up through quarters. They measure approximately 7 to 8 inches tall and 6 to 7 inches wide, according to the owl in the family.

Mama and Baby Owl banks are \$35 each. Daddy Owl is \$50
The complete family is \$100




Here is the Baby Owl Bank with hidden coin insert. The coin slot is in the bottom next to his feet. The coin removal plug is in the bottom. He is smaller and does not have his full features yet.

Mama Owl has her full colors and is slightly larger than baby owl. She has wooden pegs completely around the plexiglass.



The complete Owl Family with baby in the middle.

Daddy Owl is larger and thicker. His feet are sitting on a branch. He holds about twice as much money. He has clear hearts in his Plexiglass to allow you to see the money inside. His coin slot is on his head. His stomach can be almost any color you want it to be.



Miss Owl is a little different from the rest, as all of them are. Her Plexiglas covers her wings and feet also.

I can make owls with almost any sports team logos and colors



University of South Carolina Owl.

Clemson University Owl without logo. It can be added if you wish.

They cost \$45 each.

Owl Clocks

It seems everyone has an idea about something they would like, but cannot find anywhere. A customer bought three Owl Banks from me and asked me if I could make her an Owl Clock. Well, I have trouble turning down a challenge so here they are.





The larger brown clock is thicker and has a slightly larger body. I put a slightly larger clock in him to match his proportions. It is hard to see, but he is standing on a limb between his feet, while the others are standing on the table top. Their beaks are attached to give all of them a three Dimensional look.



I decided to put a larger clock into the white one also, to allow older folks to be able to see the clock more easily.

Owl Clocks are priced as follows:

The largest brown one is **\$80**, the white one with the large clock is **\$75**, and the others are **\$65 each**.

The price of the clock inside is the biggest determination for the price. Of course the hours it takes to make them and the vinyl eyes add to the price too.

Each clock can be removed to change the single AA battery inside.

Box Lamps and Banks.

I had a request for a Pittsburgh Steelers Lamp so I started making this series with 7.5 inch box banks and hidden lights inside. The coin slot is on the top and the remove plug is on the bottom. It has a battery pack on the back with a switch to turn the light on, have it flash, or turn it off. It holds three AA batteries.

These banks are \$100



I made it to resemble the trolley cars that ferry people up the mountains in Pittsburgh.

Then a friend asked for a Cleveland Browns lamp (for some obscure reason), so I made him one.



Cleveland Browns lamp/bank with lights on and with lights off. The legs are made like footballs.



Bulldog Banks

A lady asked me to try to make her a bank shaped like UGA the Georgia Bulldog Mascot, so I did. I hand paint the bank. It has a coin slot on the top and a coin removal plug on the bottom. The entire rear is clear Plexiglass to allow you to see your treasure. He is about a foot long and eight inches tall. He is three inches thick and sits on any flat surface.

Elephant Banks

I got the idea from a picture on the internet. Each one has clear Plexiglass on both sides so you can see your money. The Plexiglass sides have wooden pegs that hold them on and also accent the sides.

These cute little piggy banks have raised noses and heads. Everything I make is hand made from old wood so it has flaws that old boards always have that give them character. The plugs are in their fat little tummies.

It is painted like Bobo was marked. I gave it to them for a Christmas present. It is an example of what I can create if you want it.

Bulldog Lamps

One of my daughter's friends liked the Bulldog Bank but asked if I could make a lamp in the same style. So here is the Bulldog Lamp. He is the same size as the bank, but is not hollow. Each one is handmade and painted, so each one has its own personality. I use recycled pallets and other wood to make the lamp. I can think of no better way to reuse wood. I hate to see it rotting or being burned when something pretty can be made from it. It accepts all types of shades. I include a harp so you can use that kind of shade or simply use one that snaps on the socket or on the bulb.

The lampshade is optional for an additional \$10.

I gave these as presents to my great grandkids in Georgia and in Florida. I have never seen kids so excited over something of their own like they were over these. My great grandson Carston pretended it was a real dog and hugged it goodbye before he went to his dad's family Christmas party. They are handmade and hand painted. Each one is glued and screwed together for strength. I weigh 240 pounds and I can jump on them and they stay together. All contact corners are smoothed to keep little fingers from getting hurt. I hand paint all of the facial and feet features.

He is less than two feet tall and his seat is perfect for little rears. It is about eight inches high. Front and rear feet are painted so the toes show up better. They make an adorable couple, and little kids love them. I make them in all colors. They are supposed to be cartoon cats so they look cute and funny.

Furniture

Here are some of the things I took to my Grandkids this Christmas. Even the smallest who is less than 10 months old tried to climb up on them.



Popsicle Benches



\$175 dollars each

Like all of my creations, they are not available anywhere else in the world quite like I make them (if at all). I got the idea from Steve Ramsey who shares his creations with others. Each one is handmade from distressed wood to give it new life and preserve our environment. All are glued and put together with hidden screws to make them solid enough for grownups to sit on them. Each board started out as a 2x4 and ended up like these after I cut them down into smaller boards. Each one is painted and then coated with two coats of spar urethane (outdoor sealant) to allow them to resist all weather and temperatures. You can leave them outside for others to see, or put them in the house for your family to enjoy. Each one is 48 inches wide. The seat is approximately 16 inches high and 16 inches deep. The backs are about 30 inches high. they are just the right height for little butts to sit on. All boards are sanded and sharp corners removed in areas that little fingers might play. Knot holes are sanded and filled with urethane to keep little bodies from being hurt.

Small Step Stools

These stools are only 12 inches tall and about 12 inches across the tops. Check them out and you will find almost no two corners are the same. A small hole is added to allow it to be moved easily. The stool only weights a couple of pounds, so children can use them for sitting, or climbing on for a cookie. I can jump on them and they will not flex. I weight well over 200 pounds, so I feel they are very safe.

One of the most intriguing parts is that they have no screws or nails in them, only glue. The secret to their strength is an old time joint called a reverse lap joint. It is almost never used anymore.....what a shame. The joint is very strong, but hard to make, so most factories never take the time to make them. That is why handmade furniture is my favorite. I can stain it or paint it any color you wish. Or, you can paint it yourself.

Children's Picnic Tables



This table is 1/2 the size of a normal one, and can be used on your deck, or inside for the children to eat on. It can be unfinished as shown, or I can waterproof it for outdoor use. Adults cannot eat from it as you can see, but children love it when they have a picnic table of their own. It is four feet long and wide, and about 2 feet tall. It is made from 2x4s and 2x6s so it is very strong and weights about 50 pounds.

The price is \$125 unfinished, and \$150 with paint or outdoor Spar Urethane on it.

Toddler's Popsicle Picnic Table



This is a picnic table for toddlers and small children. It is designed to be used inside out of the weather. The popsicle look really makes the little ones' eyes sparkle.

It is made out of 3/4 inch lumber and weighs only about 20 pounds or less. It is 17 1/2 inches wide at the top, 3 feet long, the seats are 8 inches wide and it is about 18 inches tall. All screws are covered and sanded to keep little fingers and rear ends safe. I make an effort to sand all sharp corners down to keep accidents from happening.

It is only \$90.

Drinking Cups and Koozies



These unique containers are waterproof with a food safe epoxy inside. The outside can be had with epoxy coating, or with butcher block oil coating. As you can see, I can add your name to the cup with the epoxy coating on the outside. The tall ones hold about 12 ounces of liquid and/or a beer bottle size bottle. Some small koozies will also fit around the bottles. The liquid stays cold for a long time in these.

The shorter one holds 12 ounces also, but is a larger diameter to hold a soda or beer can with a koozie on it. It can be used to drink out of also. That's perfect when you don't want anyone to know what is in the cup.

I make the logos and names from vinyl and apply epoxy over the vinyl to keep it from coming off.

All are handmade from different wood types that I salvage. The ones shown are Black Walnut, Red Oak, and Pine. Since Walnut is very hard to get, I also use Cherry, Ash, or American Chestnut (extremely rare) to make them. Each one has 16 segments glued in a circular pattern for beauty.

Large Cups with Epoxy coating \$35

Large Cups with Butcher Block Oil/Paraffin coating \$30

Small Cups with Epoxy coating \$30

Small Cups with Butcher Block Oil/Paraffin coating \$25

Logos or Names are an additional \$20

Logos cannot be put on Oil covered Cups because they will not stick.

(These cups cannot be put in a dishwasher because the hot water and pressure will damage the epoxy.

They must be hand washed in warm water.)

Toy Truck and Accessories

The truck and accessories package kept my great grandson busy for several hours when I gave it to him. Watching him try to figure which blocks went into each container was fun. It is sitting on a serving tray to give you an idea of its size.

Little Airplanes

These aren't really toys since they are easily broken, but they would look great on a shelf, or hanging from the ceiling in your little one's room. Each one is unique, since all are hand made from scrap wood. The propeller and wheels actually turn, but again, small children would try to make them fly and they would not last long. (Ask me how I know someday).

12 Segment Picture Rings



These truly unique rings are composed of 12 segments and have slots to hold a 4x6 or slightly larger photo. I make them in almost any color you should want, plus natural color with lacquer finish. Simply put a photo in it, and set it on a shelf, or hang it on your wall. I enjoy making these and gave several away as Christmas presents last year.

Your choice of colors or the raw wood look \$40 each.

New Things To Come Yet.....

I have many more projects in the works also. I made little wagons filled with multi-colored blocks and pulled by a rope for the little kids this Christmas, and the older kids played with them almost as much as the little ones. I also made a semi-truck with a dump body, a camper body, and a trailer filled with blocks for some of them. These attachments hook to the truck with a pin on the attachment and a hole in the bed of the truck. These kept little hands and minds busy for hours. Some of the multi-colored blocks in the truck bed, the trailer bed, and the pull wagon have shapes that have to be installed in certain ways to get everything back together. It was fun to watch these young minds work out how to do it. I will post pictures and prices as I get more of them made. I also have little wooden airplanes and even boats that move across the bathtub. Well, I had them until I gave them away for Christmas presents. So.....back to the workshop again.



Still more projects in the works.
